## Adventure tales prompt book

Tracing the footsteps of Adrien de Gerlache on a sailboat expedition to Antarctica, Troy Henkels almost met the same fate as the explorer, who became

stranded there in 1890.

But it's still Henkels' favorite adventure.

"It was on this trip I became the first person to kite surf in Antarctic waters," Henkels said. "It was the most surreal experience of my life."

It's just one of many stories Henkels has to tell. He has

traveled to every continent, exploring mountains and waters, doing things most people have only read about.

The Dubuque native's book, "Life on the Edge Extreme Adventures of Troy Henkels" outlines many of these treks, complete with photos.

His extreme lifestyle started when he moved to Alaska more than two decades ago.

"My life after college was in the corporate world working 100-hour work weeks, wearing a suit and tie and commuting to work every day," Henkels said. "I knew it wasn't how I wanted to live. I had concerns that if I kept at it, I would wake up one day and realize life

had passed me by."

He has since crossed the Bering Strait, gone paragliding in Australia, become the only person to have thrown a boomerang "around the world" from both poles and more. He wrote about some of his travels as a Telegraph Herald contributor.

The book is ideal for readers of all

ages.

"It's not just a book about climbing. expeditions or skiing distances, it's a book about all sorts of adventures in all sorts of unlikely places," Henkels said. "It reflects what it took to go from growing up in Iowa to experiencing some of the harshest environments on Earth."


The book is dedicated to his father, Pete Henkels, owner of Bluebell Orchard.
